September - December 2024 South Ops Highlights

- There is a moderate tilt in the odds towards above normal large fire potential from September through November for all areas shaded in red.
- There is a slight tilt in the odds towards above normal large fire potential across the South Coast for December due to the odds favoring a drier than normal fall season.
- Large fires are likely to be primarily grass dominated and fine fuels dominated.
- Due to the anomalously wet winter and spring season, there is an abnormally large load of dead grass crop and thus a larger total fuel load than normal.
- Due to no areas of prolonged drought, larger live fuels (timber) are less susceptible to ignition than finer fuel.

Weather Discussion

A warm and dry pattern has persisted across central and southern California through August. Temperature anomalies generally ranged from 0F to 4F above normal for the overwhelming majority of the area (**Fig 1**). Most of the area saw less than 50% of the average August precipitation (**Fig 2**). There are small localized areas of positive precipitation anomalies due to intermittent monsoonal moisture resulting in slow moving heavy shower and thunderstorms, however most of the region remained dry. Since the beginning of our water year (October 1st), most areas are remaining slightly to well above average due to an anomalously wet late winter and early spring (**Fig 3**).




Fig 4: Equatorial Pacific Upper-Ocean Heat Anomaly

The El Niño Southern Oscillation (ENSO) currently remains in a neutral state due to the current transition from the El Niño to the La Niña state. Sea Surface Temperature (SST) Anomalies now range between 0.2°C and 0.4°C below normal in the equatorial Pacific (Fig 4).

Fig 1: August 1st – August 30th Temperature Departure from Average




Fig 2: August 1st – August 30th Precipitation (% of Ave.)

Fuels Discussion

A Fuels and Fire Behavior Advisory is currently in effect for central and southern California. Click here to view the latest advisory.




Fig 5: 1000hr Dead Fuel Moisture by PSA Map




Fig 6: Energy Release Components by PSA Map

Fuels continue to remain dry across most of central and southern California. Latest analysis of the 1000-hr dead fuel moisture shows 7 out of 16 Predictive Services Areas (PSAs) have below normal 1000-hr dead fuel moisture (Fig 5). This can be attributed to the very dry conditions in July and August 2024 since 1000-hr fuels have the longest response time. Some indications show the fuels are less dry at the end of August than a month ago due to below normal Energy Release Components (ERCs) for much of the Sierra Mountain PSAs due to an uptick in monsoon activity over that portion of the region (Fig 6).




Fig 7: Los Padres NF Live Fuel Moisture from August 2024




Fig 8: USDA Drought Monitor August 27th

Live fuel however continued to dry across the area in August. Latest Los Padres Live Fuel Moisture values fell to near normal, while before ran significantly above normal (Fig 7). USDA Drought monitor shows zero areas in drought status across central and southern California, the only thing to note is some abnormally dry conditions (D0) in the Central Mojave, lower and eastern deserts (Fig 8).

There continues to remain a large load of fine dead fuel as a result of the wetter than normal winter and spring months which resulted in a continued active fire season this year.

SOUTH OPS OUTLOOK




Fig 9: Sea Surface Temperature Anomaly, August 30th, 2024




Fig 10: Climate Model Predictions of the El Niño Southern Oscillation

Current SST anomalies and climate models suggest the continued trend towards the La Niña state of ENSO (Fig 9 and Fig 10) which supports a warmer and drier pattern on average during the fall and winter months for central and southern California. This trend is also reflected in the past several runs of the various climate models. Due to the combination of weather and fuels, there is a moderate tilt in the odds towards above normal fire potential in the Sierra Foothills, Southern Sierra, Central Coast, Central Coast Interior, Western Mountains, Eastern Mountains, Southern Mountains and South Coast for September and near normal potential for everywhere else in the central and southern California region. There is a slight to moderate tilt in the odds for above normal fire potential towards the Western Mountains, Eastern Mountains, Southern Mountains and South Coast for October and November. For December, there is a slight tilt in the odds towards above normal fire potential for the South Coast due to an increasingly likely dry fall and a delayed start to the wet season.



A Fuels and Fire Behavior Advisory is currently in effect for central and southern California for areas under 3,000ft.


Fuels continue to remain very dry across most of central and southern California. Multiple Predictive Services Areas (PSAs) have 1000hr dead fuel moistures between the 10th and 3rd percentile with Energy Release Components (ERCs) between the 90th and 97th percentiles. There is also a very large load of fine dead fuel as a result of the abnormally wet winter and spring seasons. Most PSAs have below normal 1000hr dead fuel moisture and above normal ERCs.


Live fuel moisture values have decreased considerably over the past couple of months. The latest 2024 average for Los Padres National Forest shows values around 85%. Given the hot and dry July, any fuels that are still live at this point are larger fuels such as larger brush and timber fuels since fine fuels and grasses have cured. Latest USDA Drought Monitor shows zero areas in drought across central and southern California. Overall, fuels remain more susceptible than normal combined with an anomalously large load of fine fuels at elevations below 3000ft.





100 Hr. Fuel Moisture Local Predictive Service Areas, September, 2024





A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE RANCHO SANTA FE FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT AMENDING THE FAIR POLITICAL PRACTICES COMMISSION'S STANDARD CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE AND CANDIDATE DISCLOSURE STATEMENT and REPEALING RESOLUTION NO. 2024-08

WHEREAS, the Political Reform Act requires certain District Officials, specified in section 87200 of the California Government Code, to file economic disclosure forms ("Form 700") and abstain from making or participating in making governmental decision which have a reasonably foreseeable material effect on an economic interest; and

WHEREAS, the Rancho Santa Fe Fire Protection District approved an "Agency Conflict of Interest Code" as required by California Government Code on May 24, 2000; and

WHEREAS, the Fair Political Practices Commission ("FPPC") has adopted a regulation, California Code of Regulations, Title 2, division 6, Section 18730 (hereinafter "CCR 18730"), which contains the terms of a standard conflict of interest code. It can be incorporated by reference and may be amended by the FPPC after public notice and hearings to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act.

WHEREAS, consistent with the biennial schedule established by the Fair Political Practices Commission for amending local conflict of interest codes, the District reviews and amends its local conflict of interest code every two years;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Fire Protection District does RESOLVE as follows:

- 1. Resolution No. 2024-08 is hereby repealed.
- 2. The Conflict of Interest Code for the Rancho Santa Fe Fire Protection District is hereby amended to read as follows:

CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE FOR THE RANCHO SANTA FE FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

The Political Reform Act, Government Code §81000, et. seq., requires state and local government agencies to adopt and promulgate Conflict of Interest Codes. The Fair Political Practices Commission ("FPPC") has adopted a regulation, California Code of Regulations, Title 2, division 6, Section 18730 (hereinafter "CCR 18730"), which contains the terms of a standard conflict of interest code. After public notice and hearing the regulation may be amended by the Fair Political Practices Commission to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act. Therefore, the terms of 2 California Code of Regulations Section 18730 and any amendments to it duly adopted by the Fair Political Practices Commission are hereby incorporated by reference. This regulation and Appendix A and B, attached to this resolution and a part of it, designating officials, employees and consultants, and establishing disclosure categories, shall constitute the conflict of interest code of the Rancho Santa Fe Fire Protection District (District).

Individuals holding designated positions shall file their statements of economic interest directly with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors via their current electronic filing system.

3. The Conflict of Interest Code for the Rancho Santa Fe Fire Protection District will become effective the date the Board of Directors approves this resolution.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommend authorizing the Fire Chief to sign the proposal (Exhibit A) with Fire Apparatus Solutions to purchase two (2) Spartan ERV IPS Type 1 engines. The budget action is requested for approval and/or modification: If authorized, the fire district will purchase the two new engines through the Houston-Galveston Area Consortium (HGAC) Buy program (Exhibit B). The district will provide a 10% down payment. The 10% downpayment of \$280,715.04 is the only financial burden required today and will be from the FY25 general fund as an unbudgeted item. The remaining amount of the contract price is due in full upon delivery in 2027. The fire district will use fire mitigation funds to cover sixty (60) percent of the cost with the nexus to development growth and the remaining forty (40) percent falls under the district's general fund.

JUSTIFICATION for Funding Request:

Staff are requesting funds to purchase two (2) new Spartan ERV IPS Type 1 Engines to replace E262/1411 and E264/1611. Fire Engines 1411 and 1611 will then become ready reserve status. The district will sell reserve engines 0311 and 0312 (2003 Spartan Gladiators) to the highest bidder through public auction surplus once the new engines are in service.

BACKGROUND:

The effects of the 2020-2021 Covid pandemic continue to impact the supply and demand on the manufacturing of fire apparatus. Depending on the manufacturer, the overall pricing of apparatus has increased by hundreds of thousands of dollars and the delivery times from time of order can range from eight hundred (800) days to four (4) years. The Fire Chief and the apparatus committee, led by Battalion Chief Roman and Captain Sanford, have had conversations to navigate the best course of action to stay on track with the district's vehicle replacement program. We have concluded that the purchasing of two new Type 1 engines, manufactured by Spartan, with a delivery date in early 2027 is the best direction to attempt to minimize the impacts of escalating future costs and get our orders in on the production line to keep the districts replacement program timeline in order.

CURRENT:

The apparatus committee completed a comparison of highly respected manufactures and has chosen the Spartan IPS fire apparatus.

Spartan- \$1.3M (800 day build time) Offers our members consistency amongst apparatus. Since we currently Utilize Spartan, the transition to a modern design would be much more fluid and consistent for our members. The cab of the apparatus will be the paint color, striping, agency marking. Customization is almost endless and provides more freedom to design a specific apparatus to best serve our community in the most efficient manner.

<u>Pierce</u>- \$1.3M (4-5 years build time) Apparatus would meet the needs of the organization; however, it comes with a 4 to 5-year lead time and a price adjustment upon delivery. Pierce also utilizes proprietary parts which come at a higher cost and longer lead times. Another concerning factor is neighboring agencies have expressed difficulties with local certified dealerships where apparatus remained out of service for extended periods of time with poor customer service. Many of our neighboring agencies are moving to other manufacturers due to their frustrations with Pierce.

<u>Seagrave</u> - \$1.7-1.9M (800 day build time) Carlsbad Fire Department utilizes this manufacturer, and they are of good quality and reliability. However, these engines are significantly smaller than our current apparatus, with no option to customize the engine. The committee felt that due to the cost, size, and lack of customization it would not be suitable or in the best interest of our organization. We carry a significant amount of ancillary equipment on our engines that other agencies do not due to the fact that the district does not operate a truck.

The district's legal counsel has approved the HGAC Buy program for purchasing fire apparatus.
